The Florida 2024 Legislative Session opened on January 9, 2024 amid terrible winter weather. Key issues for this year fall under the advocacy areas of Life & Dignity, Health Care, Family & Social Concerns, and Education. These priority issues are expected to be considered by lawmakers during the 2024 Legislative session which runs through March 8, 2024.

Readers are encouraged to visit the Florida Catholic Advocacy Network website (flaceb.org) for more information about these public policy issues. weekly summaries of legislative session will also be found on this website. Please visit and stay updated so we all know the progress being made on our issues in Tallahassee. Be prepared to respond quickly when we receive Action Alerts regarding legislative issues. I promise you, there will be a lot going on during this session - do not be afraid to contact your legislators to let them know how you feel about current issues. While they are in Tallahassee, call them, email them, write a letter, or better yet, plan a trip and visit them in Tallahassee. We all know how nice it is to see a familiar face from home when we are out of town. After session, visit them in their home office to thank them for their time and their work.

This year is a Presidential election year. While there is a lot of information swirling about all of the candidates, please educate yourselves on each of the candidates, learn about their skills and experiences, their voting records if they have previously held office, attend a campaign event if they are in your area. Avail yourself to a variety of resources to get a well-rounded impression of each of the candidates so you can make an informed choice when you cast your vote in November, for president, and in races closer to home. Every vote is important and needs to be made by an informed decision-making process.
